 year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
 and eight between John Marshall and Mary
 Willis his wife of the city of Richmond and
 James Markham Marshall and Betty his wife of
 the County of Frederick and State of Virginia
 of the one part and Rowleigh Colston of the
 County of Berkeley and State aforesaid of the other
 part Whereas Philip (Marlin) of Thing down of Great
 Britain did and conveyed unto the said Rowleigh
 Colston the said John Marshall and the said
 James Markham Marshall all that tract or tracts
 of land lying in the Counties of Loudoun Fauquier
 Frederick and Shenandoah commonly called and
 known by the name of the Manor of Leeds and
 Goony manor as will appear by a deed now of record
 in the General Court of the Commonwealth of Virginia
 and whereas the said parties to this Indenture have
 agreed to divide the lands contained in the said deed
 in the manner following that is to say to allot to
 the said Rowleigh Colston that part of the said
 Manor of Leeds which lies between Ingrigg's gap
& Ashley's Gap containing twenty six thousand five
hundred and thirty five acres and also the further quantity
of thirteen thousand four hundred and sixty five acres
lying south of Ashley's gap and to allot the residue
 of the lands contained in the said deed to the said
John Marshall & James Markham Marshall Now
 this Indenture witnesseth that for and in consideration

of the said Rawleigh Colston having by Deed beaung even
 date with these presents released to the said John Marshall
 and James Markham Marshall all the rest and residue
 of the lands contained in the said Deed aforementioned
 from the said Philip Martin and for and in consideration
 of the sum of one dollar in hand paid to the said John
 Marshall and James Markham Marshall by the said
 Rawleigh Colston the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged
 the said John Marshall & Mary Willis his wife and
 the said James Markham Marshall and Fletty his
 wife have granted bargained sold and released and by these
 presents do grant bargain sell and release unto the said
 Rawleigh Colston all that part of the said Manor of
 Leeds lying in the Counties of Frederick Loudon &
 Fauquier between Snuggers Gap and Ashby's Gap
 containing twenty six thousand five hundred and thirty
 five acres as appears by a patent thereof granted on the
 twenty first day of August in the year one thousand
 seven hundred and sixty seven to Thomas Bryan
 Martin and also one other part of the said Manor
 of Leeds lying in the Counties of Frederick & Fauquier
 South of Ashby's gap and containing thirteen thousand
 four hundred and sixty five acres as appears by a survey
 thereof made by George Bell the first day of April one
 thousand eight hundred and seven and bounded
 as follows Viz; beginning at a double red oak in a
 field shown by Capt John Battlett and other adjoining
 neighbors to be the N. W. corner of Charles Burges's, then
 Lee's new Green's tract of land running thence with
 said Green's line N, 62. E one hundred and thirty one
 poles to a leaning red oak in a swamp thence South
 Sixty nine degrees East one hundred & seventy one poles
 to a large chestnut oak on the South side of the mountain
 nearly opposite to Clarke's Mill thence South eighty four
 east one hundred and sixty ^{poles} to a clump of sharp rocks
 by sundry fallen oaks on the side of the mountain; thence
 North eighty four East one hundred and ninety six poles
 to a large white oak on the mountain side opposite William
 Gibson's thence North thirty four East one hundred and
 forty to three white oaks standing on a point or arm
 of the mountain said to be Battlett's corner purchased
 of Lee's tract thence running with his line South fifty
 three east two hundred and forty poles to Farrer's mill
 stream continued six hundred and forty poles to Mengers
 Gap road continued six hundred and sixty poles
 to Goose creek continued nine hundred & sixty poles
 to a black oak on the South side of the mountain

corner of the division of the manor thence running with
 the division line south seventy four East one
 hundred and fourteen poles to two black oaks and
 a chestnut oak in the line of Mr Thomas Adams
